

1. Grain samples must be of good quality and free from foreign matter. The Superintendent has the authority to refuse any and all entries due to excess chaff, rodent pellets, mold, musty, foreign materials, or anything that makes is unsuitable for display. Do not bring grains in glass containers. Grain must be in one (1) gallon zip lock bags. Neither the container nor the grain will be returned. Id tags and yield/variety information must be attached to bag.

2. Hay will be judged on Monday as it comes into Cloverville. Bring $\frac{1}{2}$ hay bale securely bound with cord or twine. Place $\frac{1}{2}$ hay bale in a large double strength garbage bag. Tags must be attached to the bale and not the bags-Print id tags on cardstock with a hole punched in the corner and attached using rubber bands to the bale.

3. Legume hay shall consist of 85% if the class designed legume. Grass hay shall be 85% of the class-designed grass. Mixed hay should contain only one eligible grass and one eligible legume. The legume component shall be at least 30 percent alfalfa and not more than 70% legume. Eligible legumes are alfalfa, 609. White-ear, from the current year's crop, red clover, and ladino

clover. Eligible grasses are timothy, Bermuda grass, orchard grass, tall fescue and rye grass.

The field corn and popcorn will be exhibited in trays provided by the State Fair. Variety and yield information must be included.

5. No grain exhibits will be returned. Hay will be returned to your county.

6. Roots of soybeans must be washed.

7. Exhibitor is limited to 1 entry per class. Exhibitor is not limited to number of classes entered.

1. An exhibitor may enter only one class in Entomology and no more than two entries in Honey (one extracted, one chunk).

2. Specifications for pinned-insect exhibits 687A, 688A, 689A, and 691 (see below for insect photography exhibits, 687B, 688B, and 689B):

a.9" x 13" folding cardboard insect-collection boxes available through UK College of Agriculture, Department of Entomology, should be used. Homemade or purchased wooden exhibit boxes may be used instead. They must be approximately 18" x 24" and not more than 3 1/2" thick with Plexiglas or glass covers and cellotex pinning bottoms (or plastazote or polyethylene pinning bottoms available from entomology supply stores such as Bioquip.com). Boxes must be easily opened (for instance; if a screw is used to secure Plexiglas tops, use a thumbscrew fastener instead of a fastener that requires a tool).

b.Specimens are to be arranged so the box can be exhibited horizontally. 4-H'ers may attach wires to the back of wooden boxes to help make them easier to display.

c.Identification labels available from your County Extension Office must be used, or custom labels may be printed if they conform exactly to the font, font size, and font color of the official labels. Labels should be printed onto white cardstock. The exhibit identification card should be placed on the front of the box (each box). Instructions for pinning and labeling are included in your project literature.

d.One half of the specimens may be from the previous year's collection or from anywhere in the United States; one half or more must be Kentucky insects collected since the last Kentucky State Fair. No insects that were originally collected from countries outside of the United States will be judged.

e.For the first through fifth year projects, a display collection catalog must be in an envelope attached to the back of the display box. Envelopes should be attached to permit their being opened easily to remove catalogue from them without moving the exhibit.

f.Most specimens in the display cases should be pinned, and the use of vials is discouraged. If vials are used, they may account for no more than 2% of a collection. Vials must be securely wired or pinned to the pinning bottoms.

3. Entomology exhibits are judged on the following categories: Orders, Species, Common Names, Labels, Condition of Specimens, Overall Appearance, Life Cycle Representation, Catalog of Specimens. Check with county 4-H Agent for point distribution on score sheet.

4. Exhibits will be penalized if they do not: a.Use insect pins for pinning insects.

b.Use the 4-H Entomology identification labels.

c.Use display boxes that are not the official 9" x 13" cardboard boxes acquired through the Dept. of Entomology, or wooden boxes that are approximately 18" x 24" x 3 1/2".

d.Fulfill the requirements of the particular exhibit under which it is entered.

e.Have the insects arranged so the box can be exhibited horizontally.

f.Have the display collection catalogue in an envelope attached to the back of the display box through fifth year projects.

5. No extra credit will be given for specimens exhibited beyond the numbers listed in the current project books.

6. 4-H'ers entering fifth year cannot use the same exhibit that has been judged in any previous State Fair.

7. 4-H Entomology exhibits will be divided into the following classes:

687A First year project (Up to three 9" x 13" official cardboard boxes, or up to two 18" x 24" wooden boxes, with minimum of 25 insects, maximum 50 insects, from at least four orders. Identification beyond order not necessary. All specimens must have date and locality label.)

687B First year project (minimum of 25 insect photographs, maximum 50 photographs, from at least four orders. Identification beyond order not necessary. All photographs must have notation field.)

Specifications for insect photography exhibits:

a.Images will be submitted on a USB memory device (such as a "thumb drive") with no other data except for the images and folders. The USB device must be identified externally with a tag or label, showing "4-Her's last name-County-Lot Number-Class Number-Entry Number." Honey will show better in oval, flat sided to square clear glass containers. 4-H'ers must use standard honey jars. Wide-mouth mason jars or wide-mouth honey jars may be used. The jars and lids must be clean. Fill jars to the "fill line". The "fill line" is the continuous ring that circles the jar and not necessarily the threads that help hold the lid. Note: Two jars must be submitted for the following classes.

Display cases for capped honey may be made by 4-Hers or bought from a store, but they must be bee- proof and have a removable top in order for the judge to check moisture. One frame per container.

Observation hives shall be secure from opening to the satisfaction of the Bees and Honey superintendent. This shall include the top of the observation hive and all holes and openings. Openings should be secure by screws or locks. Observation hives may be picked up after the end of judging Display cases for capped honey may be made by 4-Hers or bought from a store, but they must be bee- proof and have a removable top in order for the judge to check moisture. 1. Educational posters MUST relate to dogs and be completed since the last State Fair. Poster must be judged at the county level before entry at the State Fair. Only one entry per class per county is allowed (county winner must have received at least a blue ribbon at the county level before entered at the state fair level).

2. Posters should encourage the participant's imagination in developing a slogan/ theme that promotes a breed or project or educates the viewer about a dog project related activity. Examples of topics include but are not limited to: showing/grooming/ caring for your dog, dog health, nutrition, and breed charac teristics. Posters should be simple and focus on one message to tell the story of your dog poster theme. Resource information should be attached to the back of the poster (resource may be in envelop with youth name and county, class listed on envelop). Reliable resource information should be used (please note that Wikipedia may not be a reliable source).

3. Participants may use a variety of media, however no 3-dimensional posters will be allowed and no text cut directly from a magazine will be allowed (such as a cut-out of a magazine article used for the poster).

4. Posters must be no smaller than 20" x 30" and no larger than 24"x 30." Poster format should be portrait (vertical) not landscape. Posters must be made using one of the following, matt board, or foam core board. No poster board is allowed. Posters submitted on poster board will be disqualified at entry.

5. Copyrighted characters such as Snoopy, Charlie Brown, or other cartoon characters cannot be used.

1. Exhibits must be made based on the appropriate units in the 4-HCCS Electric Excitement project books. Projects entered using Snap Circuits® kits will be disqualified.

2. Exhibitor is limited to one entry per division.

3. All exhibits requiring bulbs must have the correct size.

4. Use of molded plug-ins is not prohibited but discouraged.

5. Any electric project observed or judged to be unsafe or potentially harmful to the public or surrounds will be disqualified immediately and disabled for further use.

6. Effective strain relief should be provided for all wire to terminal connections. Knots, clamps, connectors, or staples are acceptable when used appropriately.

b.Place the baked product on a disposable plate. Place the plate inside a re-closable ziptype bag to maintain freshness and prevent damage. (Exhibit will not be disqualified if the plate is not inside the bag.

c.Use of plastic film or aluminum foil to wrap product is discouraged but will not cause the product to be disqualified.

d.To prevent damage, wrapped cakes should be transported in a sturdy container such as a cardboard box. Containers, pie pans, etc. will NOT be returned to the exhibitor. 



h. Each picture must be mounted securely. Rubber cement or dry mounting tissue is recommended. Do not use photo mounting corners.

i. Photos (except horticulture classes) must include the following a description. The description must be typed, on white paper, and placed directly below the photograph it is identifying. The description must include the following:

4-H/FFA Market Livestock Shows and Sale General Rules

General Superintendents: Jaimie Mann – Vo-Ag. Instructor – FFA Advisor Kelly Armour- Vo-Ag Instructor- FFA Advisor Julia Harmon - Pendleton County Extension, 4-H/Youth Development CERTIFIED LIVESTOCK LEADERS: Nancy Adams, Chip Cline, Olivia Cline, Martha Gosney, Nathan Mains, Sadie Turner, and Dana Wyatt

NOTERules are subject to change due to possible extreme circumstances; all decisions will be finalized by the Pendleton County Fair Board.

1. Show and sale open to 4-H and FFA members in Pendleton County only. Members must show as 4-H or FFA, no crossing. 2. Animals must be accompanied by Extension or Vo-Ag Instructor or accompanied by written state of eligibility.

2. Members may show as many animals as they wish. Only one (1) animal per member may sell, members must show the species they are selling in the market show.

3. All animals must be broke to show and must be shown by member unless in the case of illness, more than one animal in a class or a conflicting 4-H or FFA event, then animal may be shown by another Pendleton County 4-H or FFA member. This is subject to 4-H or FFA advisor approval.

4. Animals will be weighed as unloaded with presentation of a valid Health Certificate.

5. Pendleton County Youth Fair will provide a night watchman.

6. All exhibitors must indicate at weigh out the animal they intend to sell. Exhibitors will have up to 30 minutes after the conclusion of the Friday night Swine show to change the animal they wish to sell.

7. If an exhibitor wins showmanship for more than one species and then goes on to win another showmanship for another species, they will represent the first species won to complete in the Round Robin. Therefore, the reserve showman of the second species will represent that species in the Round Robin. If the reserve showman is already representing a species in the Round Robin, then the judge will be asked to pick a third individual to represent that species in the Round Robin.

8. If you are a Champion and/or Reserve Champion Showmanship winner, in each age division, your Showmanship animal may be picked to show in Round Robin. It is your responsibility to have your animal ready to be exhibited in Round Robin. Failure to have your Showmanship animal ready would result in forfeiting your Showmanship premiums. Showmanship animals must remain at the fairgrounds until after the Round Robin, or have been released by either the FFA Advisor/4-H Agent.

9. Only exhibitors, ring master, and judge will be allowed in the show ring during Market Livestock shows.

10. All animals are allowed to leave the fairgrounds after each night's show.

11. All grooming rules are in compliance with the KY Department of Agriculture (KDA) guidelines. Local leaders must be identified by the local 4-H Agent and/or FFA Advisor in a list submitted to their respective organization. A leader's service must be available to all members in a club, chapter or county.

12. Market animals will be shown by weight/not breed. 4-H/FFA animals will show together in conformation. Each animal may only show as EITHER market OR breeding.

13. If animals do not meet weight requirement, they will be able to show in weight class but not eligible for sale.

14. There will be a Rate of Gain class. Animals must have participated at the official weigh-in site for their species.

15. All classes will be judged on the Danish System. A Champion and Reserve Champion in each class and an Overall Champion and Overall Reserve Champion will be selected.

16. Pendleton County Best Bred and Owned will be selected after the last Market Class.

17. PENDLETON PROUD – Awards will be given to Producer and Youth exhibiting an animal purchased from a Pendleton County Livestock Producer and born in Pendleton County.

18. Showmanship is limited to and mandatory for Pendleton County 4-H and FFA exhibitors. In each species there will be a 4-H and FFA Novice showmanship class for first year exhibitors in respective species. Showmanship divisions will be: Novice, Junior, and Senior for 4-H and FFA. An overall Supreme Champion Showman and overall Reserve Supreme Champion Showman will be selected for each species. Each exhibitor will only show showmanship one time per species but may choose either their market or breeding animal to exhibit.

19. Round Robin Showmanship Class will be held on night of sale. Winner will receive "traveling" trophy, belt buckle and \$50. 00. Reserve champion will receive \$25.00.

20. 4-H and FFA members must submit a completed project record book on or before Sunday June 18th, 2023 from 2-4pm during county fair entry take-in to be eligible to show, sell or have animal/animals on fairground.

21. The Dale Kirsch Memorial plaque will be awarded to the most outstanding livestock exhibitor at the Pendleton County Youth Fair. The winning exhibitor will have excelled in the SkillA-Thon, showmanship, and confirmation classes earning points in each division. The exhibitor with the highest total points will win this award along with \$100.

22. There will be no resale of animals.

23. All members must attend 6 hours of educational meetings by June 1St 2023. Exhibitors with 20 hours or more will earn ONE 1-week fair pass (excluding rides). Field trips, community service and participation in fundraisers counts towards the exhibitor's fair pass ONLY.

24. Appropriate dress is required for shows and sales. Suggested hard sole shoes, required long pants and appropriate shirts/polos- No T-shirts.

25. Upon loss of KUIP tag exhibitor must immediately contact either the 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor.

26. All lambs and goats must have valid scrapie free tag/identification. All male MARKET animals must be properly castrated by their respective weigh-in/validation site.

27. Each exhibitor will be provided with up to two photographs to give buyers. Additional photographs may be purchased if youth has more than two buyers.

28. Exhibitors will be responsible for delivering buyer flyers to their potential buyers. Everyone will be charged at the gate of the fairgrounds.

29. The buyer will be responsible for taking the animal home on the day of the sale and handling additional processing details. Unless the animal is sold to the stockyards or donated back.

30. There will be no charge to exhibitors for Buyer's Meal. Each exhibitor will also be responsible for providing a grab and go dessert to serve the buyers during the Buyer's Meal. The

buyers meal will be held before the Market Sale on June 24th 2023 from 5:30 PM to 6:30 PM at the PCYF fairgrounds. Details will be sent to all exhibitors and Buyers prior to the event.

31. All sale participants are required to turn in a written thank you letter (letters) when you pick up your buyer's picture. Pictures will have a voucher (sign-off) receipt. The exhibitor will have their buyer sign the receipt when they deliver their picture. Exhibitor will then receive their check when receipt with buyer's signature is returned to the Extension Office. Pictures must be picked up from the Extension Office no later than August 1, 2023.

32. Eligibility for FFA Members will follow national guidelines until high school graduation. Upon graduation from high school students pursuing full-time, post-secondary education will be allowed to show in the four fairs past high school graduation and must be a member in good standing with Pendleton County FFA (paid membership). Members in good standing are eligible for the sale the summer after graduation from high school and not thereafter if they choose to show under FFA while in post-secondary school.

33. All award winners are asked to send a "Thank You" note to sponsors.

34. Under the 4-H/FFA Youth Livestock Rules and Regulations, it is stated that the animal being exhibited must be in the possession and continuous care where youth provide the majority of care for the animal by June 1, 2023. EXCEPTION: Market Steers/Heifers must have been in the possession and under the continuous care of the exhibitor by March 24, 2023. Care for the animal would consist of but not limited to: daily feeding, halter breaking, grooming, and practicing for the show, health and other activities as desired.

35. The Youth Livestock Advisory Committee, FFA Advisor, County Extension Agent for 4-H Youth Development and reserve the right to make project visits with prior notice.

36.All livestock and rabbit and poultry exhibitors will be required to take a Skill-A-Thon test administered by Leaders on Sunday June 18th, 2023, from 2-4pm during county fair entry takein. Exhibitors must score 50% or higher to be eligible for awards from Skill-A-Thon, winners will receive \$50.00 and second place winners will receive \$25.00.

37. There will be 4% of each exhibitor's sale check (not including add-ons) withheld for overhead costs and champions. From this amount, 3% goes back into the livestock committee fund

to pay for sale costs, buyer pictures and frames, etc. while the remaining 1% goes back to the champion and reserve champion showmanship winners of their respective species. Sixty percent of the 1% goes to the showmanship winner of that respective species and 40% goes to the reserve champion. $\$

38. In case of emergency, if you are unable to be at the fairgrounds prior to your species weigh out, contact 4-H/FFA advisor or livestock leader prior to weigh-out start time for permission to arrive late.

39. Violations of the Code of Show Ring Ethics: Any violations of the Code of Show Ring Ethics or any other rules and policies associated with the Pendleton Co Youth Fair and the Kentucky State Fair may result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualification, loss of sale proceeds, probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation. Any illegal substances found at slaughter will result in forfeiture of all premiums and revenues from the sale of the animal. Violations of these rules may result in both animal and exhibitor being disqualified from the show.

40. PROTEST PROCEDURE: A. All protests must be made in writing, plainly stating the reason for the protest or appeal and must be filed with the Chairman of the Pendleton County Youth Fair, FFA Advisor or 4-H Agent within 24 hours of the species-specific show. All protest must be accompanied by a \$100.00 cash deposit which will be forfeited if the complaint is not sustained. B. All protests will be considered at a time set by the Pendleton County Youth Fair 41.Any questions not covered by the above rules will be referred to KDA guidelines.

Executive Committee and the interested parties will be notified and given the opportunity to submit evidence. C. In addition to the right of protest herein guaranteed to interested parties, the Pendleton County Youth Fair Executive Committee expressly reserves the right to take cognizance of fraud, which may have been consummated or attempted, and to take such action as may be deemed just and proper.

All livestock/animals offered for sale or exhibition at Kentucky County Fairs shall meet the following regulations according to KRS Chapter 257: a. 302 KAR 20:040 (Entry into Kentucky)

b. 302 KAR 20:065 (Sale and Exhibition of Kentucky Origin Livestock)



RULES:

1.All exhibitors must report to the Exhibitor Check In table prior to entering the show area. 2.Only open to Pendleton County 4H/FFA members. All members must attend 6 hours of educational meetings and be active members of the PC Poultry Club prior to the show. Meeting attendance will be signed off on by Poultry Club leaders.

3.Check in begins on Monday at 5pm. Judging will begin at 6pm. Show will run simultaneously with the Open Poultry Show. 4H members are able to enter either the Open or the 4h show, but not both.

4.All exhibitors are required to complete the skillathon contest that will be set up at the county fair during entry day on Sunday June 18, 2023 to participate in the the show.

5.All entries must be removed after all classes have been judged.

6.Health forms are not required, but any bird showing any signs of illness will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately.

7.All entries shall consist of a single specimen.

8. Proper dress is required for showmanship, Appropriate dress is long pants, hard sole shoes or boots, and appropriate shirts. Lab coats are encouraged but not required.

9.Exhibitors are limited to 5 entries per breed. Where there is only one exhibitor in a class, 1st place will be awarded by merit.

10. Animals must be at the livestock barn 1 hour before show time to be registered. Animals will not be allowed to leave the barn until the conclusion of the show.

11.Birds can not be shown by more than one exhibitor.

12.Exhibitors must place their own birds on the table. If the exhibitor requires assistance, the club leader, President, Vice President or Secretary is able to assist.

13. The fair will not be held responsible for loss of any kind.

14.All bird must contain some type of ID: leg band, toe punch, etc.

15. Any class with more than 3 entries will be broken down by breed. Any breed with more than 3 entries will be broken by sex and or variety.

16.Poultry leaders and/ or the 4H agent has final say and the discretion to amend rules and policies





3. All Berkshire swine must be registered by the American Berkshire Association (ABA), P. O. Box 2436, 1769 US 52 West, West Lafayette, IN 47996. Said registration paper must be presented at time of check in.

4. The ABA is the only Berkshire swine registry recognized by the National Association of Swine Records (NASR) and the National Pedigreed Livestock Council (NPLC).

5. An exhibitor of more than one purebred breed must have been an active member of each breed association for more than ninety (90) days immediately prior to the show. 5. All animals to be exhibited must be properly checked in with show management prior to the show. Registration papers for purebreds must be presented at check-in.

6. All animals exhibited must carry ear notches or ear tags identifying litter to which they belong.
7. All animals exhibited must be December, January, February or March pigs. Purebred breeding swine will be broken into classes based on age. Commercial breeding swine will be broken into classes based on weight. Exhibitors of Commercial breeding swine will need to turn in a weight card declaring weights.

8. All hogs to be eligible to compete must have been owned by the exhibitor for at least sixty (60) days prior to the opening day of the Kentucky State Fair. For purebred animals, the day of purchase shall be construed to be the date transfer is recorded with the Record Association.

9. All animals placing will be checked for ear notches or ear tags and registration papers will be required for purebred animals.

10. All purebred pigs shown must be registered in the Record Associations of the breeds to which they belong, and must be in the name of the exhibitor. All purebred pigs must exhibit typical breed characteristics. Exhibitors must be prepared to show certificates of registry and proper transfer for all purebred animals they are showing. 11. Any animal that, in the opinion of the judge, is being shown out of class shall not be awarded a prize.



18. Wheelie bars wheels or skid plates cannot exceed five inches in height and must extend beyond

the rear tires.



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
