QUILTING Category

All projects are to follow these guidelines/ requirements:

HORTICULTURAL PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBITIONS

Horticulture is the science, art, technology and business concerned with intensively cultivated plants that are used by people for food, for medicinal purposes, and for aesthetic gratification.

Horticulture is divided into two categories: The cultivation of plants for food (pomology and olericulture):

• Pomology deals with fruit and nut crops. (not included in photography classes)

• Olericulture deals with herbaceous plants for the kitchen, including, for example, carrots (edible root), asparagus (edible stem), lettuce (edible leaf), cauliflower (edible flower), tomatoes (edible fruit), and peas (edible seed). (included in photography classes)

Plants for ornament (floriculture and landscape horticulture).

 Floriculture deals with the production of flowers and ornamental plants; generally, cut flowers, pot plants, and greenery. (included in photography classes)

• Landscape horticulture is a broad category that includes plants for the landscape, including lawn turf, but particularly nursery crops such as shrubs, trees, and climbers. (not included in photography classes)

For the purposes of the Kentucky 4- Horticulture Photography Contest, only photographs representing the areas of Olericulture and Floriculture will be accepted.

4-H/FFA Market/Breeding Livestock Shows and Sale General Rules

- **NOTE**Rules are subject to change due to possible extreme circumstances; all decisions will be finalized by the 4-H/Youth Development Advisor, FFA Advisor, and Pendleton County Fair Board.
- 1. Show is open to ALL 4-H and FFA members. In order to be eligible to sell at the PC Livestock Sale, the 4-H/FFA member much reside in Pendleton County only and have a parent/legal guardian that is a legal resident of Pendleton County. Members must show as 4-H or FFA, no crossing. Animals must be verified by Extension or Vo-Ag Instructor or have a written state of eligibility.
- 2. Members may show as many animals as they wish. Only one (1) animal per member may sell, members must show the species they are selling in showmanship.
- 3. All animals must be broke to show and must be shown by member unless in the case of illness, more than one animal in a class or a conflicting 4-H or FFA event, then the animal may be shown by another Pendleton County 4-H or FFA member. This is subject to 4-H or FFA advisor approval.
- 4. ALL animals must have a valid Health Certificate.
- 5. All goats must weigh a minimum of 65 lbs. at the official weigh-out to qualify for sale. All steers/heifers must weigh a minimum of 950 lbs. at the official weigh-out to qualify for sale. All lambs must weigh a minimum of 90 lbs. at the official weigh-out to qualify for sale. All pigs must weigh a minimum of 200 lbs. at the official weigh-out to qualify for sale. Any animal not making the minimum weight requirement on the first weigh-out can take the animal off the scale and re-enter the scales for a second weigh-out. Animals may NOT leave the premises before second weigh out.
- 6. All exhibitors must indicate at weigh out the animal they intend to sell. Exhibitors will have up to 30 minutes after the conclusion of the Friday night Swine show to change the animal they wish to sell.
- 7. If an exhibitor wins showmanship for one species and then goes on to win another showmanship for another species, they will represent the first species won to compete in the Round Robin. Therefore, the reserve showman of the second species will represent that species in the Round Robin. If the reserve showman is already representing a species in the Round Robin, then the judge will be asked to pick a third individual to represent that species in the Round Robin.
- 8. Only exhibitors, ring master, photographer, and judge will be allowed in the show ring during Market Livestock shows.
- 9. All grooming rules follow IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS guidelines. (Following General Rules)
- 10.Market animals will be shown by weight/not breed. Each animal may only show EITHER market OR breeding, not BOTH.

- 11. If animals do not meet weight requirement, they will be able to show in weight class but not eligible for sale.
- 12. There will be a Rate of Gain class. Animals must have participated at the official weigh-in site for their species.
- 13.PENDLETON PROUD Awards will be given to Producer and Youth exhibiting an animal purchased from a Pendleton County Livestock Producer and born in Pendleton County or raised by a Pendleton County exhibitor.
- 14. Showmanship is limited to and mandatory for Pendleton County 4-H and FFA exhibitors to sell. In each species there will be a 4-H and FFA Novice showmanship class for first year exhibitors in respective species. Showmanship divisions: Novice, Junior, and Senior for 4-H and FFA. An overall Supreme Champion Showman and overall Reserve Supreme Champion Showman will be selected for each species. Each exhibitor will only show showmanship one time per species but may choose either their market or breeding animal to exhibit.
- 15.4-H and FFA members must submit a completed project record book on or before Sunday from 2-4pm during county fair entry take-in to be eligible to sell.
- 16.All livestock exhibitors will be required to take a Skill-A-Thon test administered by Leaders on Entry Sunday from 2-4pm during county fair entry take-in. Exhibitors must score 50% or higher to be eligible for awards from Skill-A-Thon, winners will receive \$50.00 and second place winners will receive \$25.00.
- 17. All members must attend 6 hours of educational meetings by validation date to be eligible to show. Exhibitors with 20 hours by the beginning fair date (which must include at least 3 hours of community service) or more will earn ONE 1-week fair pass. Field trips, community service and participation in fundraisers count towards the exhibitor's fair pass ONLY.
- 18. Appropriate dress is required for shows and sales. Suggested are hard sole shoes. Required is closed toed shoes, long pants and appropriate shirts.
- 19. Upon loss of KUIP tag, the exhibitor must immediately contact either the 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor. KUIP tags are required for all animals to show according to state rules. Must have replacement paperwork on hand or an approved EID tag.
- 20. All lambs and goats must have valid scrapie free tag/identification. All male MARKET animals must be properly castrated by their respective weigh-in/validation site.
- 21. Eligibility for FFA and 4-H Members will follow national guidelines until high school graduation. Upon graduation from high school students pursuing full-time, post-secondary education will be allowed to show in the four fairs past high school graduation and must be a member in good standing with Pendleton County FFA (paid membership) and 4-H. Members in good standing are eligible for the sale the summer after graduation from high school and not thereafter if they choose to show under FFA or 4-H, while in post-secondary school.
- 22. Under the 4-H/FFA Youth Livestock Rules and Regulations, it is stated that the animal being exhibited must be in the possession and continuous care where youth provide the majority of care for the animal by final KDA validation date. Care for the animal would consist of but not limited to: daily feeding, halter breaking, grooming, and practicing for the show, health and other activities as desired.
- 23.All exhibitors must participate in "set-up" or "tear-down" at the Pendleton County Fair. Dates and time will be provided.
- 24. The Youth Livestock Advisory Committee, FFA Advisor, and County Extension Agent for 4-H Youth Development reserve the right to make project visits with prior notice.

- 25. In case of emergency, if you are unable to be at the fairgrounds prior to your species weigh out, contact 4-H/FFA advisor or livestock leader prior to weigh-out start time for permission to arrive late.
- 26.If you are a Champion and/or Reserve Champion Showmanship winner, in each age division, your Showmanship animal may be picked to show in Round Robin. It is your responsibility to have your animal ready to be exhibited in Round Robin. Failure to have your Showmanship animal ready would result in forfeiting your Showmanship premiums. Showmanship animals must remain at the fairgrounds until after the Round Robin or have been released by the FFA Advisor or 4-H Agent.
- 27. Violations of the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics: Any violations of the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics or any other rules and policies associated with the Pendleton Co Youth Fair may result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualification, loss of sale proceeds, probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation. Any illegal substances found at slaughter will result in forfeiture of all premiums and revenues from the sale of the animal. Violations of these rules may result in both animal and exhibitor being disqualified from the show.
- 28.All sale participants are required to turn in a written thank you letter/s when you pick up your buyer's picture. Pictures will have a voucher (sign-off) receipt. The exhibitor will have their buyer sign the receipt when they deliver their picture. Exhibitors will then receive their check for the purchase of the animal only when receipt with the buyer's signature is returned to the Extension Office. You will receive the check for the add-on's at a later time (3-4 weeks). All pictures must be picked up from the Extension Office no later than August 1, 2025. If you do not pick up your picture, your checks WILL be returned to the Pendleton County Youth Fair Board. ALL CHECKS MUST BE CASHED BEFORE JANUARY 1, 2026 OR FORFEITED TO THE LIVESTOCK FUND.
- 29.PROTEST PROCEDURE: A) All protests must be made in writing, plainly stating the reason for the protest or appeal and must be filed with the Chairman of the Pendleton County Youth Fair, FFA Advisor or 4-H Agent within 24 hours of the species-specific show. All protest must be accompanied by a \$1000.00 cash deposit which will be forfeited if the complaint is not sustained. B) All protests will be considered at a time set by the Pendleton County Youth Fair Executive Committee and the interested parties will be notified and given the opportunity to submit evidence. C) In addition to the right of protest herein guaranteed to interested parties, the Pendleton County Youth Fair Executive Committee expressly reserves the right to take cognizance of fraud, which may have been consummated or attempted, and to take such action as may be deemed just and proper.
- 30.All grooming rules are incompliance with Kentucky Department of Agriculture (KDA) guidelines. Local leaders must be identified by the local 4-H Agent and/or FFA Advisor in a list submitted to their respective organization. A leader's service must be available to ALL members in a club, chapter, or county.
- 31. Any questions not covered by the above rules will refer to Pendleton County Livestock Committee, Pendleton County Youth Fair, FFA Advisors or 4-H/Youth Development Agent. All decisions made by the prevailing entity are final.

4-H/FFA MARKET/BREEDING LIVESTOCK SHOWS AND SALE General Information

- 1. Pendleton County Youth Fair will provide a night watchman.
- 2. All animals are allowed to leave the fairgrounds after each night's show.
- 3. All classes will be judged on the Danish System. A Champion and Reserve Champion in each class and an Overall Champion and Overall Reserve Champion will be selected.
- 4. Round Robin Showmanship Class will be held on the afternoon of sale. The Winner will receive "traveling" trophy, belt buckle and \$50.00. The Reserve Champion will receive \$25.00.

5. The Dale Kirsch Memorial plaque will be awarded to the most outstanding livestock exhibitor at the Pendleton County Youth Fair. The winning exhibitor will have excelled in the Skill-A-Thon, showmanship, and confirmation classes, earning points in each division. The exhibitor with the highest total points will win this award along with \$100.

6. Pendleton County Best Bred and Owned will be selected in Breeding shows only and

Pendleton Proud will be selected in Market classes only.

7. Each exhibitor will be provided with up to two photographs to distribute to buyers. Additional photographs may be purchased if youth have more than two buyers.

8. Exhibitors will be responsible for delivering buyer flyers to their potential buyers. Everyone


will be charged at the gate of the fairgrounds.

9. The buyer will be responsible for the animal at the drop of the hammer and for taking the animal home on the day of the sale and handling additional processing details unless the animal is sold to the stockyards or donated back. Pendleton County is not responsible for processing any large animal.

10. All award winners are asked to send a "Thank You" note to sponsors.

11. There will be 4% of each exhibitor's sale check (not including add-ons) withheld for overhead costs and champions. From this amount, 3% goes back into the livestock committee fund to pay for sale costs, buyer pictures and frames, etc. while the remaining 1% goes back to thechampion and reserve champion showmanship winners of their respective species. Sixty percent of the 1% go to the showmanship winner of that respective species and 40% goes to the reserve champion.

12. All sellers and a parent and guardian must have signed the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics to participate in the show/sale.



IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels. All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada. The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of, consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and

except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

- 6) The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expos and any special notices to members.
- 11) The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.



Market Class Additional rules:

These rules will serve as additional/supplemental rules to the general rules outlined for the 4H/FFA show rules.

- 1. All exhibitors must report to the Exhibitor Check-In table prior to entering the show area.
- 2. Only open to Pendleton County 4H/FFA/CLOVERBUD members. All members must attend 6 hours of educational meetings and be active members of the Pendelton County Poultry Club prior to the show. Meeting attendance will be signed off on by Poultry Club leaders.
- 3. Exhibitors who are between the ages of 9-18 may elect to sell their project at the Market Livestock Show and Sell. Ages 5-8 are ineligible to sell.
- 4. Exhibitors may only sell their poultry broiler pen or Turkey if they are not selling another species at the Market Livestock Sale.
- 5. Exhibitors are required to complete the skillathon contest that will be set up at the county fair during entry day on Sunday June 15, 2025, to participate in the Market Livestock Sale.
- 6. Exhibitors are required to complete a Poultry record book and enter it at the county fair. This will be done during entry day on Sunday June 15, 2025. Failure to do so forfeits the ability exhibitor the ability to participate in the show and to sell their animals in the in-Market Livestock Show and Sale.
- 7. Exhibitors must present their own bird to the judge. If the exhibitor requires assistance, the club leader, President, Vice President, or Secretary can assist.
- 8. Exhibitors may enter their market class animals in the showmanship class.
- 9. Market animals cannot be shown by more than one exhibitor.
- 10. Health forms are not required, but any bird showing any signs of illness will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately.
- 11. Lab coats are encouraged to be worn by exhibitors.
- 12. All market poultry sold at the Market Livestock Show and Sale are to be dispatched at Dispatch Day on Sunday June 22, Exhibitors must attend and actively participate in the dispatching process. Any exceptions must be approved by the Poultry Club Leader.
- 13. For Poultry Meat pens: exhibitors will be allotted 5 Cornish cross chicks from the poultry club. Project completion includes raising the chicks, submitting a poultry record book, completing the skillathon, showing the poultry in the market show and at the show and sell (if applicable) and dispatching the poultry for the buyers during poultry dispatch day.
- 14. For Turkeys: exhibitors will be allotted 2 broad breasted white turkey poults from the poultry. Project completion includes raising the poults, submitting a poultry record book, completing the skillathon, showing the turkey in the market show and at the show and sell (if applicable) and dispatching the turkey for the buyer during poultry dispatch day.
- 15. Exhibitors are limited to one meat class entry in each class.
- 16. Cloverbud market class will be for turkey and chicken meat pen.
- 17. A poultry pen will consist of 3 birds weighing a minimum of 4 pounds per bird. Poultry

not reaching minimum weight will not qualify for Show and Sale.

18. A Turkey entry will consist of a single turkey weighting a minimum weight of 15 pounds. Turkeys not reaching minimum weight will not qualify for Show and Sale.


